Religious and Cultural Events in School

As part of our review of Religious Education (as Camden has changed its syllabus) we have been working on RE and our Cultural offer inside of school.

We love serving a diverse community and having parents/carers coming into school to speak about their religion or culture but we can be overwhelmed by the number of offers we have – we've only got so many hours in the day and lots to fit in already. We've therefore created a "timetable" of things we would love parents/carers to come and share with us. We also created a help sheet (over the page) to guide parents in how to communicate with the classes.

We are aware that this doesn't include every festival for every religion or culture as that would unfeasible and inappropriate.

You will obviously continue to celebrate festivals at home, the school will learn about some in RE lessons and some will be covered in assemblies as will major festivals of religions not mentioned here.

Below is a list of things we would love you to share with each class.

We have included all of the major religions that we know that we have in the school but the list will constantly evolve so if you have something from a different religion you would like to share then please let Debbie, Rob or Ruth know and we can consider it for our list.

Food stuffs are welcome but please check for allergies and diets;

A maximum of three parents/carers sharing each festival in a class – that may mean organising yourself over your time at school;

Bring artefacts (e.g. nativity sets, prayer mats, photos, menorahs) to show;

Remember these are learning opportunities not parties;

Share facts not opinions/beliefs (e.g. **how** a festival is celebrated rather than the **why**); Have simple age appropriate activities;

Use English as that is our common language (but include words in your home language with translations) so that everyone is included;

Modify the vocabulary you use according the age of the class;

Be culturally aware – our community is gloriously diverse and everyone has the right to celebrate (or not celebrate) a religion if they choose;

Be religiously aware – be mindful that in some belief systems icons are not permitted to be used and that different people celebrate the same religion in different ways (this may be for personal or cultural reasons);

Try not to be absolutist - Use language like: In my religion **some** people XXX... Do not either directly or indirectly imply that any religion or belief system (or none) is more valid than any other - everyone has a right to believe and worship how they would like to:

Please do not take photographs or videos – the teachers will do this to share; Be environmentally friendly when making resources or giving gifts

Artefacts

We are purchasing a collection of religious artefacts (such as prayer mats, crucifixes, menorahs, statues, etc) using the money kindly donated by the FSA. But if you are ever replacing something you use to worship and would like it to be put to good use them we would gratefully receive it. That way the children can look at them more closely in class.

This week in class

Nursery

This week we shared a family photo with our friends and named all the people in our family. The pictures and photos are on display in class. We read 'Love makes a family' and 'Part of the party' which supported our understanding of what makes a family....LOVE! This week our focus children were Aviv, Ellie T and Matteo. Aviv shared her favourite book from Peppa pig and she wanted to play princesses. We made our own princess crowns! Ellie T wanted to learn about unicorns and rainbows; we watched a short video about rainbows and then painted rainbows, as well as making unicorn masks. Matteo shared his love for music; we made musical shakers and danced to Matteo's favourite songs. We have also been developing our listening skills through a range of listening games on the interactive whiteboard. Thank you to Roman's mum and Elijah's mum for reading us a story this week. Also, thank you to Matteo's dad for his PowerPoint about Argentina, the children had a wonderful morning exploring Argentina and enjoyed the yummy treats!

Reception

Reception have been getting good at remembering sounds, and learning new ones. This week we started the day off with a green day to help remember the grapheme 'g'. We dressed in green and labelled everything green in the classroom. We then learnt 'o', and the two graphemes for 'c/k'. We enjoyed playing with conkers, making crowns, making kites and colouring kings. It was lovely to share some of our activities with our parents on Tuesday, as we had a phonics stay and play. Our drawing club book this week was 'we're going to find a monster', and we enjoyed drawing our own monsters and then making it come alive! Finally we had our first guided reading this week, in small groups we read the book 'Sound Walk' where we had to look for lots of different items that made noises. The drill we think would have been the loudest.

Class 1

This week in literacy we have been reading the story 'Giraffes Can't Dance' and discussing some lovely adjectives within the story. In phonics we have started looking at phase 5 words. The children have learnt the sounds 'ay', 'oy', 'ea' and 'ou' and have been writing some lovely sentences containing these graphemes. In maths we have finished looking at place value to 10 and have been doing lots of lovely practical activities and investigations in class. In art we have planned and designed our African clay pots ready to create next week. In PSHE we have discussed our value of individuality and have created a display centred around how we are all different but we are all special.

Class 2

We have had a dramatic week in Class 2, experiencing what the Great Fire of London would've looked, smelt and felt like. A vast, hot fire burned through the houses that we had made and we were able to see just how quickly it spread, enabling us to write an Introduction and first paragraph of our information booklets about the Great Fire. In maths, we have been looking at related facts. If we know that 3 + 7 = 10 for example, what else do we know? Perhaps that 10 - 7 = 3 or 30 + 70 = 100. The children have obviously been working hard on their spellings at home, as their results have improved massively in the past fortnight. Thank you for your support in this.

Class 3

Class 3 have had a wonderful week, showcasing how settled they are with their routines and classroom expectations. In Maths, we have been so proud to see students scores improving in their weekly multiplication test. It is proving that constant exposure and repetition is supporting their recall. We urge students to continue regular practice whenever they can, as a confident knowledge of these facts will support their understanding with more complex math topics later on. In Literacy, we have been continuing exploring diary entries, using inspiration from Captain Scott's expedition to the Antarctic. Within this, we have been guiding students through the process of correct structure, as well as expressing thoughts and feelings in writing by using a variety of language. We are so lucky to have a class full of creative writers. It is always an absolute joy to read their work and even better when they are proud of themselves and want to read it to the class.

Class 4

It has been another busy and very productive week. We started our addition and subtraction unit in maths which began by learning to add and subtract 1s, 10s, 100s and 1000s. We noticed quickly how this was linked to our previous learning of place value. Not only that, but we then learned how to add 4-digit numbers using the formal written method of column addition with no exchanges, with one exchange then with more than one exchange. Again, we made links and used our previously learned skills, knowledge and understanding of place value to help us to do this. In literacy, we started writing our legends independently this week, which we had planned at the end of last week. They are loosely based on Robin Hood as well as being set in the same time period, the medieval times. However, we used our own ideas and were creative whilst changing the plot. We aimed to apply our learning of expanded noun phrases, figurative language, speech, paragraphs and fronted adverbials whilst writing these. In history, we reinforced and deepened our understanding of the ancient Egyptian ritual of mummification by explaining the key steps in the process in more detail and in our own words. We also set up an investigation to mummify fruit using our own 'natron' mixture, and we will observe any changes to notice the effect natron mixture has and its preservation effects as well as its usefulness in the ancient Egyptian ritual of mummification.

Class 5

This week, Class 5 has been learning in Maths how to use addition and subtraction to check answers, calculate and find missing numbers in equations. In English, we started analysing the features of narrative poems, looking into different literary techniques. In History, Class 5 learned about the Ancient Greek gods and goddesses and in Science we studied the process of metamorphosis.

Class 6

We started our week by discussing the week's guided reading skills: the children have looked at retrieval, skimming a text and self-questioning. There are 18 skills to becoming an independent reader and our aim is to cover them all by Easter. In games this week, the children practised passing into a space and signalling intent with their hands using the sport of netball as the medium and small, competitive games to instil a sense of competition. In P.S.H.E. the children thought about a goal that they wanted to accomplish and planned out the necessary steps in order to be successful. In Maths, we learned about squared and cubed numbers and we reviewed quite complicated multiplications with answers in the hundreds of thousands. In R.E. we talked about how different faiths celebrate their religion via art, music or other artistic means.
