



- ◆ The equator runs around the centre of the Earth and is the part of the world, as it is closest to the sun
- ◆ The Tropics is between the Tropic of Cancer and the Tropic and Capricorn
- ♦ 71% of the world is covered in water
- ◆ There are 7 mountain ranges in the world and the largest tallest mountain is Mount Everest (8849m)
- ◆ The longest river in the world is the River Nile (6650km)
